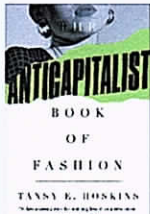

Bangladeshi garment workers are facing unprecedented attacks on their workplace freedoms and civil liberties. There are currently 44,000 unnamed arrest warrants circulating in Bangladesh after November's minimum wage protests - these warrants have been designed to create a climate of fear and stop people from unionising. With the tacit approval of major high street brands, Bangladeshi garment workers are encountering systematic punishment and retaliation, including violence, arrests, terminations, and killings.
